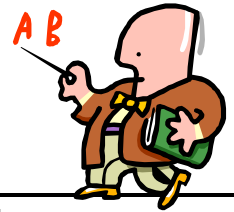


Professor Madcap's Mishap

Professor Madcap has to give a talk about decorative features on buildings and other structures. Unfortunately his slides and lecture notes are all jumbled up. Can you help him sort them out in time? Each picture matches a description. Correctly pair the right picture to its corresponding description by drawing a line between them.



Console

A console is an ornamental bracket with a curved outline. This particular example is tucked under the eaves of a roof and gives the illusion that it is helping to support it.



Cupola

Cupola means dome. Usually the term is used to describe a small dome. These are often sited on a round turret or a roof top. Sometimes they are used to crown the top of a much larger dome.



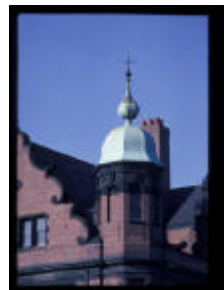
Quoins

Some buildings have decorative quoins on their corners. These are dressed stones used to highlight the angle of the corner. The alternating pattern is known as long and short work.



Ogee hipped roof

The towers on this building have ogee hipped roofs. Ogee means a double curve (like the letter **s** on its side). A hipped roof tapers inward from the ends as well as the sides.



Balustrade

A balustrade is basically a handrail. This example decorates a bridge but they are also used on staircases. The ornate posts supporting the stone coping above (forming the handrail) are called balusters.



Shaped Gable

The area of wall at the end of a double pitched roof is known as a gable. A shaped gable is a more decorative form of this. Rather than just a plain, straight edge it features a number of curves and is generally more ornate.
